Basic Steps to Making an Instructional Video





FIND THE RIGHT EQUIPMENT

- A newer cell phone with a camera
- Headset or Air pods to minimize background noise

WRITE A VIDEO SCRIPT

RECORD THE VIDEO

- Check your surroundings
- Try to:
 - o **Limit traffic/people** behind you that can be distracting
 - o Limit people talking around you



EDIT THE VIDEO

- Check with SMEs to know your video output sizing, for example, 1024x768
- Check for the format needed to play the videos for the audience, e.g., MP4



SMES AND STAKEHOLDERS PREVIEW THE VIDEO

• Ask reviewers to **note any changes needed** and to **note the time the item/edit/error occurs** in the video.



PUBLISH THE VIDEO

- **Before publishing**, find out where the video will reside. LMS, YouTube, etc.
- Find out if the stakeholders want the ability to play, replay, and pause, this choice is made during the publishing.

Steps for writing a video script	 START WITH THE BRIEF: A short paragraph explaining what the video is about and its goal. a. Who is your audience? b. What is your reason for making this video? c. What do you want your audience to learn from this video? CREATE AN OUTLINE: write down all the steps and points you want to touch on during your video. a. Start with a hook/lead-in to grab the viewers' attention – what is the goal of this video tutorial? b. Follow up with a re-engagement to keep their attention c. Setup the story and lead towards the purpose of the video d. Reach the goal – all safety materials are in place, tasks complete, etc. e. Wrap up/lead out with a recap of the goals WRITE YOUR SCRIPT: write the script with each line you plan on saying, so write as you usually speak. a. In a conversational tone as if you were speaking – keep it simple b. By being specific and detailed by add all information about the task you are showing, tell the person recording where to zoom in etc. (types of shots, or any visual elements) c. Keep your audience in mind -speaking as you would if you were showing them the steps/task in-person, and writing how you would want them to hear you speak to them ADD THE AUDIO AND VISUAL ELEMENTS: for each shot, write down exactly what should be happening in the scene, including camera movements and sounds. REVISE AND TRIM: read your script out loud a couple of times and cut down on any unnecessary parts. 	
Errors during recording/talking	If there is an error or interruption while recording, just keep recording. Items such as sneezes, coughs, or interruptions can be edited out.	
Audio	If you are in a loud area of the plant, you may need to record without audio. You can then go back and record the audio. If possible, view/play	
	the video while recording the audio - it will make it easier to sync the audio and video.
